Add/Drop – deadline Friday, September 9

Satisfactory/No-Credit (S/NC) Grade Option – deadline Friday, September 23

“Certain courses are offered on the S/NC (Satisfactory/No-Credit) grade option. This option was designed to encourage students to explore new and potentially difficult subjects without fear of the risks of failure. Under this option, a student who does satisfactory work (a grade of C or better) in a course receives the grade of S. If the student’s work is not satisfactory (a grade of C- or lower), the grade of NC (No Credit) is given. Courses for which an S is received are counted toward graduation, but are not computed in the GPA. Courses in which an NC is received are counted toward neither graduation nor the GPA.”

12. Norman H. Horowitz Fellowship – deadline Sep 12

Dr. Norman H. Horowitz established this endowment in recognition of the role undergraduate research played in his own decision to pursue graduate training in science. The fellowship is available to a student in the senior year or one who has completed a substantial amount of research. The student is expected to work at least ten hours per week during the academic year and present a talk at the departmental Undergraduate Research Symposium in late spring. Work must be done in a research lab in the Department of Biological Sciences. The stipend is \$3000 for the academic year, along with \$500 for supplies.
